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


Themes for panels




Interplay of Gender, Technology, and Nature

This conference panel seeks to unravel the interplay of gender, technology, and the natural world as portrayed in South Asian literature within the context of modernity. As societies experience rapid transformations in the wake of technological progress, the intersection of gender identities and environmental relationships takes on a new significance. This panel analyzes how contemporary South Asian authors navigate the complexities of gender roles, technological innovation, and the evolving natural landscape, offering fresh insights into the evolving cultural fabric. The panel will delve into narratives that challenge conventional notions of gender and reimagine humanity's connection to nature within the modern context through close readings of diverse literary works.

Technology and Social Change in South Asia


Populist Politics in South Asia

Politics of Migration in South Asia

This panel intends to contribute to different aspects related to the issue of migration in South Asia. South Asia plays a significant role in the 'context shift' of migration from the Global North to the Global South, which must be asserted with distinct perspectives. The discussions will revolve around the debates on how migration has shaped South Asian politics and policy changes, intersecting the issues of citizenship laws, border conflicts, forced migration, and refugee aspects to the region's security dynamics. The panel is open across disciplines (including but not limited to politics, economics, international relations, human rights, policymakers, and law).



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
